- 2019-20 Joint Primary Investigator, isiXhosa Intellectual Traditions under Colonialism Project, Department of Sociology, University of Cape Town.
Project goals: Digitize, archive, and host early isiXhosa language newspapers (1860-1912) and isiXhosa literature in image and e-text format. Train researchers in methods of qualitative and quantitative text analysis on isiXhosa texts. The first research outputs will include a series of papers which explore the development of indigenous African intellectual traditions in South Africa; including traditions of sociological analysis and emerging African nationalist and Pan-Africanist political imaginaries.
- 2017-20 Research Assistant, Florentine Political Debates project, University of Chicago, Prof. John Padgett
This project collects and analyses political debates in Florence’s *Consulte e Pratiche* political body over 150 years from 1350-1500. I have used natural language processing (NLP) and computational content analysis tools to build the database of speeches, and undertaken analysis of this corpus using computational content analysis, semantic network analysis and regression methods.

I developed and managed a Python based program to integrate new historical records into a unique database containing 250 years of social network data. The program automatically matches new records to the existing dataset and scores the probability of an accurate match using data from both the record and the full historical data set, as well as a custom built language dictionary to match between Latin and Italian.
